Block Party Portland!

Block Party, previously called National Night Out, has been celebrated across North America on the first Tuesday of August since 1983. It's a day when neighbors hold parties to strengthen community cohesiveness and crime resistance, and get to know their neighbors. When neighbors get to know each other, they create a connected and safer community.

Every year, more than 20,000 people in Portland participate. This year, the time has been extended to the first 2 weeks of August. The City of Portland allows neighbors to shut down local traffic service streets and receive waivers on noise variance permits for block parties. Brooklyn Climate Group Update by Jeff Kleen

The Brooklyn neighborhood is going through some big changes. Two large apartment developments are being built along SE Milwaukie Ave. and more are expected. When developers came to speak at a Brooklyn Action Corps (BAC) meeting, members of the climate group started to wonder if the new apartments would include gas stoves, furnaces, and water heaters—locking them into the use of methane for decades to come and posing a threat to the health and well-being of residents. When it comes to climate change we hear a lot about carbon dioxide, but methane (what is called "natural gas") has up to 86 times the global warming potential of carbon dioxide (learn more at https://350pdx.org/). Electrification creates an opportunity for homes and buildings to be safer, healthier, and more resilient, and powered by renewable energy-like solar power (including community solar programs like Oregon Shines*), and other emerging technologies.

A climate justice group member reached out to the developers and learned that one building will have gas infrastructure while the other will not. The group realized that the neighborhood should be proactive in urging developers not to include gas heating and appliances before they start planning and building. This led the group to draft a resolution that the BAC voted in favor of recommending new developers or remodelers not connect to gas. While the resolution isn't legally binding, it's a clear statement of the neighborhood's values of health, clean air, and climate justice. Read the resolution on the BAC website. Brooklyn is the first neighborhood in Portland to pass such a resolution, which pertains strictly to new developments, not existing homes.

The climate group will send the resolution to the Multnomah County Commissioners to urge them to vote for a county-wide ban on gas infrastructure in NEW developments. The City of Milwaukie recently joined cities across the country in passing a similar resolution. County commissioners may vote on the concept as early as September.
